


LETTER TO OUR READERS:

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COUNTRY CLUB MANOR DEMOGRAPHICS

In the Country Club Manor Directory (as of April 11, 2024), **283 Homes** are listed of which **240** are homes with Shares and **43 are homes** without shares.

This represents a ratio of <u>85% Shareholders</u> and <u>15% Non-Shareholders</u>.

It is estimated there are 192 Year-round Resident owned homes and 91 Winter Resident Owned Homes (Snowbirds). This represents a ratio of 68% Year-round Resident owned homes and 32% Winter Resident owned homes.

Joint Owners = 140 or 49% Single Male Owners = 67 or 24% Single Female Owners = 76 or 27%

How these numbers were derived:

Year-round Residents *Determined by No alternate address listed in Directory

Winter Residents (Snowbirds) *Determined by 2 addresses listed in Directory

In conclusion, 423 individuals are listed in the Directory, of which 272 individuals are Year-rounders and 142 are Winter residents, also fondly called Snowbirds.

Individuals who own more than one home and are therefore listed more than once in the Directory were not doubly represented in any demographic.

<u>31 homes</u> changed ownership in 2023 and we welcomed <u>48 new residents</u>.

According to Park Manager, Amy Atterberry, there is **only 1 vacant LOT for sale – 11A.**

SOCIAL ACTIVITIES AT CCM:

COUNTRY CLUB MANOR CO-OP INC. PRESIDENT'S REPORT APRIL 18, 2024

Spring is here, the weather is getting warmer and warmer, and the Snowbirds have either left, are about to leave, or will be leaving in May. Just a reminder for those who will be leaving soon, TURN OFF YOUR WATER when you leave. This could prevent a major disaster while you are gone. Another thing to do is to put away or secure all things outside that could become projectiles in a storm.

The 2024 hurricane season is predicted to be an active one, and we have already noticed a change in the intensity of our hurricanes, tropical storms, and almost daily summer thunderstorms in Florida. Last summer (2023) I walked around the park and took notice of things that were large and loose and notified the owners to secure them. I will do the same this summer. If you notice a neighbor who is leaving or who has already left that has loose objects that might fly in a heavy wind, please remind them that everything must be storm proofed and secure. We have experienced hurricane force winds here in Lake County the past 4 summers and I don't hear anything to indicate that it will change.

There have also been some thefts of valuable items (golf carts, electric bicycles). We are working with the Eustis Police Department to try to determine who is doing it. It is happening all over Lake County, not just Country Club Manor. Chains and locks for bicycles, wheel locks for golf carts, and

blocking in golf carts with parked cars can help to slow down the thefts. Another thing that is effective, inexpensive, and fairly easy to do is to install motion-activated security lights. It will not only help you find your keys in the dark, but it will also let neighbors know that somebody is at your carport/front door/ etc. While nothing will stop a determined thief, locking things up will slow the thieves down and perhaps send them to easier pickings elsewhere. We are also looking into putting in cameras in strategic locations so that we can hopefully see who is doing the thefts.

We have had some major expenses like tractor repairs (\$3,162.00) and bids for storm water drainage issues and major plumbing upgrades and repairs are coming in. This happens at a time when we are still struggling to get our financial information back from our former manager who moved everything financial to his company and is still delaying and resisting returning our information to us. I don't understand what the problem is, but he moved the information without asking us or even telling us about it. We found out when our banking, deposits, and daily financial things started developing weird problems. We have notified him and his company to transfer back the information, but only some of that has happened and there is no explanation for why the rest has not.

That's it for now. I will be resisting any major nonemergency expenses until we know the true condition of our finances. And be vigilant for your own and your neighbors' protection.

EXCURSIONS A VISIT TO SIMPLER TIMES— MICANOPY, FLORIDA

The Town of Micanopy (pronounced mick a no pee) is in Alachua County Florida, located south of Gainesville. The census population recorded in 2020 is 648. Micanopy is the oldest continuously inhabited community in the interior of Florida. Wikipedia

On a recent and perfect 74-degree Spring day, a trip to Micanopy was in order. Just fifty miles and an hour and a half from Country Club Manor is this peaceful, laid-back tiny town; which seems to be just the things visitors and townspeople love about it.

The main attraction of the town is Main Street, with its antique and boutique shops, historic museum, and signature cafe. A vintage small town with vintage shops, friendly people, and unique Old Florida charm, it's the ambience that makes Micanopy a treasure.

Main Street takes you back to Simpler Times. Shop owners do not keep specific hours, rather you may simply find a sign on the door Open or Closed. Even the Historical Society Museum hung out a Closed sign. None of the shops have public restrooms; instead, you are directed to The Café, well known for its inviting wrap around front porch.

Many of the shop owners are long-timers. The Shop, for example, owned by Marlene Oberst, recently celebrated its 44th anniversary. It started out as an antique store, yet over the years evolved into a medley of enchanting collectibles, gifts, crafts, and antiques. There are rooms for all seasons with something to look at in every corner showcasing Christmas, Halloween, Valentines, St. Paddy's, and other festive days. *Many of our readers are familiar with Peddlers Wagon in downtown Eustis. This shop is reminiscent of it on a smaller, more countrified scale.

Dakota Mercantile, owned by Sharon Conchiglio, has offered a unique shopping experience for 26 years. The merchandise offered here is all about classy and gracious living that reflects a medley of vintage and luxurious home décor goods and Southern charm.

Micanopy has its claims to fame. Doc Holliday was filmed here, and here too stands the Historic Herlong Mansion Bed and Breakfast. Country music artist John Anderson's mentions Micanopy by name in his famous song "Seminole Wind" released in 1992. The song peaked at number two on the *United States Billboard Hot Country*

Singles & Tracks and laments the destruction of the environment by humans for economic gain.

Micanopy is that unspoiled town where Progress never came and simpler times exist. If you want to discover Old Florida, you can't go wrong with a visit to Micanopy. Allow a couple of hours to look around and Feel that Small Town Friendliness.

It's easy to include a visit to Devil's Millhopper Geological State Park in nearby Gainesville. Along with nature trails, is a wooden staircase with handrails down to a final platform where you can view the sink hole that formed when ¬limestone underneath it collapsed. There are twelve springs which feed the pond that lay at the bottom of the sinkhole. The return trip to Eustis is under two hours.

HOW TO STOP UNWANTED CHARITY JUNK MAIL

Please Note: This article regarding unwanted mail pertains only to the postal mail which we receive in our physical mail boxes; it does not pertain to computer emails which can be successfully eliminated by sending to the spam folder, which in turn blocks future emails from those senders.

We are all familiar with receiving unwanted, unrequested solicitations in our mail boxes. My friend (who asked to remain nameless) discussed with me the excessive amount of charitable marketing communications that she receives on a daily and weekly basis and how disheartening it is to be constantly barraged with graphics that focus on the worst of humanity, including abject poverty, deformities, and sick children with cancer.

She is bombarded by correspondences that include address labels, note pads, pens, greeting cards, coins, and other unsolicited gifts from charities. Many of the companies waste additional marketing dollars by affixing pre-paid postage to their return donation envelopes. We discussed how there seems to be no simple answer for getting removed from these mailing lists and what a huge amount of marketing dollars and materials are wasted.

Since February 26th, we have been tracking her incoming charitable mail pieces. In this six-week timeframe, 75 separate charitable organizations have sent a solicitation and 25 of these organizations have sent multiple solicitations. That is an average of 12.5 new charitable solicitations per week or a math potential of 650 new charitable companies contacting you per year.

It seems that a major reason for the huge increase in charitable mail is that prior to 2017, you used to be able to declare charities as a taxable deduction. When the tax rules changed, less people were donating, because of not getting a tax deduction and alternative and aggressive marketing tactics progressed to the extreme of annoying.

In the battle to help her declutter her junk charity mail, we created a separate and exclusive Gmail account for communicating with them. Some charities include an email address and/or a website in their correspondences and some provide neither. If we can locate an email address, (as time permits) we are writing them directly. Other charities have a Contact Us on their website and/or a special form to request removal from their mailing lists.

Through April 15th, we have contacted 33 charities requesting that they remove her name from their database. 19 of these 33 companies have responded that they would remove her contact information. So far, A typical response from these charities is: "Your details have been added to our Do Not Mail list. Due to relatively long production lead times for printed mailings, we ask that you allow approximately 90 days for all mailings to cease." In addition, a few charities (Salvation Army included) wrote: "Several large data brokers make available people's names, addresses, and buying habits to organizations that send direct mail solicitations—including charities. To stop your name from continuing to be sold we recommend that you contact the major list sellers of contact information, and advise them NOT TO SELL YOUR CONTACT INFO."

In the *Battle against receiving Unwanted Charitable Junk Mail*, there is a double edge sword, as to be truly effective, the individual charities need to be contacted and advised to remove your contact information, as well as the list sellers. (Ouch!)

Here are links for opting out of some of the largest consumer databases, which should reduce the amount of both non-profit and commercial marketing materials received:

- DMAchoice.org Direct Marketing Association is one of the largest do-not-solicit lists in the U.S. and can help reduce unsolicited mail from all types of marketers. Charity Navigator advises that when you tell the Direct Marketing Association you don't want to receive unsolicited mail, you should specify that includes mail from both charitable and commercial organizations. Otherwise, the DMA will just put you on its for-profit list only.

This battle to stop the barrage of these solicitations is a project in progress. Stay tuned in for a future progress report.

Despite or perhaps because of adversities, Bob enjoys his life and is thankful and joyful. He is an upbeat and Welcome addition to our community.



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



someone and let it be.


I have learned: The truth will set you free.
