ROC NEWS

The ROC Board of Directors now numbers ten. With the resignation of one member, the HC ROC management team will continue without electing or appointing another member. Joe Chapman volunteered to become Treasurer and will join the Executive Committee.

Rules and Regulations (R&R) are the glue that holds our community together. They range from ordinary common sense to detailed and specific conditions. Most of us bought here with the understanding that we – and our neighbors – agree to follow the obligations outlined in the R&R document; and that is the key to an attractive, safe, and well-managed community.

If you have not done so in the past few years, do take a few moments to look over your copy of the Rules and Regulations. Implied or stated, in all cases, the homeowner has responsibility for adherence to the various R&R. Any concerns should be directed to members of the BOD or the office.

Naturally, there may be questions about enforcement. Be assured that this Board is committed to a uniform, fair, and consistent, yet aggressive, policy in dealing with R&R violations.

A few specific examples of R&R that have been ignored or misinterpreted recently include: Some homebuilders – looking to cut corners on landscaping – have approached homeowners in our community to purchase their palms. Be aware that the unauthorized removal of any tree from any property is in violation of our Rules and Regulations. If a tree is storm damaged or diseased you will still need a removal permit and the homeowner must replace the tree, though not of the same size or type. Should the tree be sold, or otherwise removed without a permit, the homeowner will be required to replace the tree with another of the same size and type. If you have any questions please check with the office.

By and large, any changes to the outside of your

home will need approval of the Architectural Committee. Any changes to the interior are up to you, your contractor, and Sarasota County. If in doubt, please check with the office before starting any projects.

All homeowners are responsible for their renters or guests. See Rules and Regulations, XII, A and VI. Any renter must always be registered with the Harbor Cove office as well as any long-term, (more than two days) household guest or visitor. Visitor/guests enjoying our amenities should display the HC ID visitor badge if the homeowner is elsewhere.

As previously noted the Fining Committee has been formed. Neglecting to correct a situation or ignoring an R&R violation notification can result in a fine and/or other actions against the homeowner.

There are a number of ways to do this; but please fill out an architectural request, and give it to the office to be approved.

Speeding - I have received a lot of complaints on vehicles driving extremely fast on Fleetwood and Blackburn. The police have been notified and they will be patrolling the area.

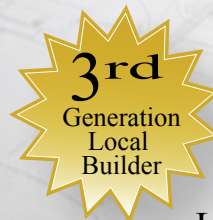
Judy Scherer, chosen as our 2014 Nautical Lady, is the 32nd Nautical Lady of the Boat Club Ladies Auxiliary.

"ELVIS" CHEESECAKES

We had many requests for the desert recipe served at our Ladies Auxiliary fund-raiser.

Crust:

- 1-3/4 cup crushed Honey Graham crackers
- Melt 4 tablespoons butter (or more). Add 1 tablespoon at a time to get the consistency you want. Place crumbs in bottom of 9 oz. plastic wine cup and press down.

Cake:

- 3 8-oz cream cheese – softened
- 3 cups powdered sugar
- 3 teaspoons vanilla
- 3-3/4 cups Cool Whip
- 1 can fruit pie filling

Beat softened cream cheese until smooth. Add sugar 1 cup at a time. Add vanilla. Beat until smooth. Fold in Cool Whip until evenly mixed. Spoon into cups leaving room for topping. Refrigerate several hours. Add topping before serving.

APRIL LEASEHOLDER NEWS

About seventy people, representing 45 leasehold properties attended our Annual Meeting this year. This represents about 21% of the membership, a little smaller than usual. The minutes of the meeting are posted on our bulletin board in the lower level of the recreation hall.

Thanks to Guy Attanasio, our Nominations and Elections Chairman for doing the honors. Guy nominated the following for a term of one year: President - Jim Ringler, Vice President - Carol Walters, Treasurer - Dottie Walters, Secretary - Dianna Attanasio and Plat 2 Director – Bob Prior for a period of 3 years. The above were elected.

Our thanks to John Kushner, Past President of R.O.C. for installing our officers and also doing our financial audit.

Our attendance was small but we had some good discussions. The fees for the marina slips, storage area, lawn service and NEW north recreation facilities remain the same. We now have 31 of us using the storage area, 3 using the marina slips, 109 using the lawn mowing service and 41 using the north side recreation facilities. There were only 8 sales of lease properties in 2013 compared to 18 in 2012 and 10 in 2011.

In 1999 we voted to stop collecting annual dues and to ask all new lease owners to pay a \$15.00 transfer fee. This fee was to be collected from both actual sales and family transfers. Over the years we have been negligent in contacting those new 99-year leaseholders to inform them of this new fee. We relied on people reading about it in the Bulletin and talked about at the Annual meeting. At that time we had a reserve of about \$8,500 and we thought that amount would be enough to get us started if we had to go to Court again for any reason. Since then our reserve CD grew to \$10,500.

We appointed Nicole Eddy as Chairperson of a membership committee made up of the Officers of the Lease Holders, to contact the leaseholders that we had neglected to contact in the past. These are 99-year transfers since the year 2000. We feel that every 99-year leaseholder would want to do their share to make sure that our Association continues to protect our lease hold rights, if it should become necessary. Please remember, when it was necessary back in 1971-72, the leaseholders at that time, raised money (much more than the \$15.00 we ask for) to become incorporated under the Florida Statutes, went to court and got a decision that protected our rights as Leaseholders and paid yearly dues until the year 2000. If any 99-year leaseholder wants to see any of the court and formation papers, let me know. We don't expect to have a need for any court action because we are able to work with R.O.C. and management to solve any problems that may come up.

As 99-year lease holders we sign the acceptance of the original lease and agree to follow the rules and regulations of the community. Our concern is that

the enforcement is consistent between all types of ownership which it has not always been, especially prior to becoming a R.O.C.

By the time you read this, some of you will be on your way to your summer residence. There are a few things to remember when it comes time to leave. If you are using cable service through the Civic, be sure and pay your fees before you leave. Make sure your emergency contact form is filled out and turned into the office. Make sure all loose items are stored away so they don't become flying missal in a storm.

Make arrangements with someone in the park to check your property and keep the weeds that grow very fast during the summer rainy season under control.

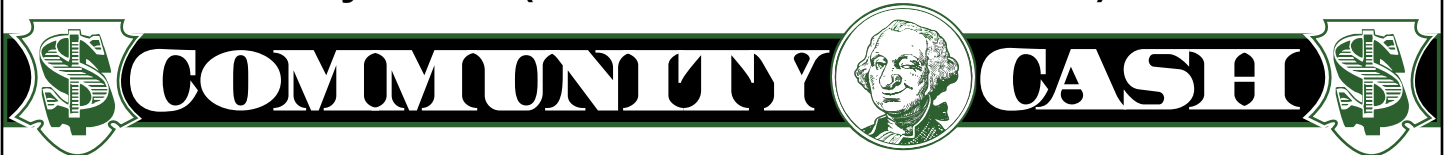

Most everyone should have received their Civic Association notice to renew the cable TV in their homes. For the 2014-2015 season the fee is \$330.

This is the first price increase in three years of using Verizon as the provider of our cable TV service. At an average of \$27.50 per month there is no better TV bargain. Some residents have tried the satellite services and found that after a promotional period their fees skyrocketed.

Verizon's fee structure to Civic is such that any home that is wired for Verizon must be charged. This means that any wired-in home where the owner declines cable TV must still be paid for by your Civic Association.

The deadline for your payment is June 30, 2014. Please pay by (US bank) check only. Make checks payable to: HARBOR COVE CABLE TV. For your convenience there is a lock-box in the office for dropping off your checks.
