SCAM ALERT

Identity Theft

Warning signs of identity theft

- Bills for items you did not buy
- Debt collection calls for accounts you did not open
- Information on your credit report for accounts you did not open
- Denials of loan applications
- Mail stops coming to, or is missing from, your mailbox

How to report identity theft

To report identity theft, contact:

- The **Federal Trade Commission** (FTC) online at IdentityTheft.gov or call 1-877-438-4338
- The three **major credit reporting agencies**. Ask them to place fraud alerts and a credit freeze on your accounts.
- The **fraud department at your credit card issuers**, bank, and other places where you have accounts

How to protect yourself from identity theft

- **Do not answer phone calls**, texts, social media messages, or email from numbers or **people you do not know**.
- Do not share personal information like your bank account number, Social Security number, or date of birth.
- **Collect your mail every day** and place a hold on your mail when you will be on vacation or away from your home.
- Review credit card and bank account statements. Watch for and report unauthorized or suspicious transactions.
- **Understand how ATM skimming works** and how to protect yourself
- Learn when it is safe to use a public Wi-Fi network
- Store personal information, including your Social Security card, in a safe place. **Do not carry it in your wallet.**

Imposter Scam


The top types of imposter scams:

An imposter scammer may call, text, or email to convince you they are **someone in authority**. They may even use caller ID to make it look like they are calling from an official government or business' number. To commit identity theft, they try to get you to send money or a gift card or share personal information.

- **Government** imposter scams - Unless you contact them first, government agencies typically initiate communication with you by letter. Unexpected contact or demands through any other method may be a scam.
- **IRS** imposter scams - scammers pretend you owe the IRS money for taxes and may threaten legal action
- **Social Security** imposter scams - scammers claim there is a problem with your Social Security account or promise to increase your benefits
- **Charity** scams - scammers pretend to be from a real or fake charity and try to get you to contribute
- **Grandparent** scams - scammers pretend to be a grandchild or other relative who needs emergency financial help
- **Tech support** scams - scammers tell you your computer's security is at risk and try to remotely access your device and steal personal information or ask for payment
- Scammers may also pretend to be from your **bank or a company you do business with**. You might be told you owe money or there is a problem with your account.

MANAGER'S REPORT

Real Estate Sales Update

Sales momentum continues with **two additional homes currently under contract**. Properties located at **33 Starboard** and **101 2nd Avenue** are scheduled to close in **April**, bringing more new residents to Harbor Lights.

The continued buyer interest highlights the appeal of the Harbor Lights lifestyle- **waterfront living, an active community, and a prime location near downtown Venice**. We look forward to welcoming our upcoming neighbors and wish them a smooth closing process.

Night Swimming at the Pool

This issue of offering night swimming was raised a few years ago and with all the new people coming to the park, we are taking another look at offering extended pool hours.

A swimming pool deck lighting study is being conducted to determine what additional lighting may be required to achieve illumination levels necessary for safe night swimming in compliance with the standards of the Sarasota County Health Department. The study includes a **photometric survey and analysis**, which measures the amount and distribution of light across the pool deck and surrounding areas.

The purpose of the study is to ensure that lighting is sufficient for **safe swimmer visibility, deck safety, and proper supervision**, while also identifying any areas where additional lighting or fixture adjustments may be needed to comply with applicable health and safety regulations.

Resident Electric Upgrades

We have had a positive response with residents when we contact them about their electrical issues that need upgrading. As mentioned last month, we noticed several resident electrical issues that require prompt attention, including rusted and deteriorated electrical pedestals and areas where wiring has become exposed. These conditions present safety concerns and must be corrected to maintain compliance with applicable codes. We are trying to be proactive to ensure all necessary repairs are identified and completed before Code Inspection from the city of Venice comes through the park. Thank you to all the residents that we are contacting. We appreciate your cooperation.

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HARBOR LIGHTS PENINSULA SHORELINE PROTECTION PLAN

The proposed shoreline protection plan for the peninsula at Harbor Lights Cooperative is designed to stabilize the shoreline along Roberts Bay while improving long-term resilience and environmental health. The plan combines traditional structural repairs with modern “living shoreline” techniques to reduce erosion, protect property, and enhance marine habitat. Over time, wave action, storms, and natural coastal processes can gradually erode shorelines and weaken existing seawalls. To address these concerns, the proposed plan combines traditional shoreline protection with environmentally friendly “living shoreline” methods. This hybrid approach is designed not only to stabilize the shoreline but also to enhance marine habitat and water quality.

Key components of the plan include:

Seawall Repair: Traditional seawall repair using **vinyl panel inserts** is a common and effective method for restoring the structural integrity of aging seawalls. This technique is often used when an existing seawall has developed cracks, voids, or erosion behind the wall but still has a basic structure that can be reinforced. In this repair method, **interlocking vinyl sheet piles** are driven into the ground directly in front of or alongside the existing seawall. These durable vinyl panels form a new continuous barrier that helps stabilize the shoreline and prevent soil from washing out behind the wall. The vinyl material is highly resistant to corrosion, saltwater, marine organisms, and weathering, making it well suited for long-term use in coastal environments.

EcoWAD® Wave Attenuation Structures: Engineered EcoWAD® units from Living Shoreline Solutions are large precast concrete marine structures designed to sit and reduce wave energy before it reaches the shoreline. The EcoWAD® would be strategically placed based on a wave attenuation study performed by Dr. Ping

Wang of W&R Coastal Sciences and Solutions. These structures function similarly to a reef system, dissipating wave force while encouraging marine growth and habitat development.

The size of the EcoWAD® is custom made for each location but they can be 6 feet tall with each unit weighing in as much as 9,000 pounds (about 4–4.5 tons). The large weight helps the structures: stay stable on the bay bottom, even during storms; dissipate wave energy effectively rather than simply deflect it; and provide a solid surface for oysters, barnacles, and marine life to attach, creating habitat similar to a natural reef.

Mangrove Planting: Native mangroves would be planted along suitable shoreline areas. Their root systems naturally stabilize soil, trap sediment, and provide habitat for fish and wildlife while helping buffer storm surge and waves.

Rip Rap Rock Protection: Strategically placed rip rap (large stone) along vulnerable shoreline sections will help armor the shoreline and prevent further erosion in higher-energy areas.

Together, these elements form a **hybrid living shoreline system** that blends engineered protection with natural coastal processes. By combining these approaches—seawall maintenance, EcoWAD® wave attenuation, mangrove plantings, and rip rap protection—the Harbor Lights shoreline plan aims to create a **balanced, resilient coastal protection system**. This strategy supports both structural stability and environmental sustainability.

The Board believes that taking proactive steps now will help protect the peninsula for many years to come while maintaining the natural waterfront character that makes Harbor Lights Cooperative such a special community. As planning progresses, residents will continue to be updated through newsletters and meetings regarding project details, timing, and next steps.

All this occurs in the background without your need to do anything.

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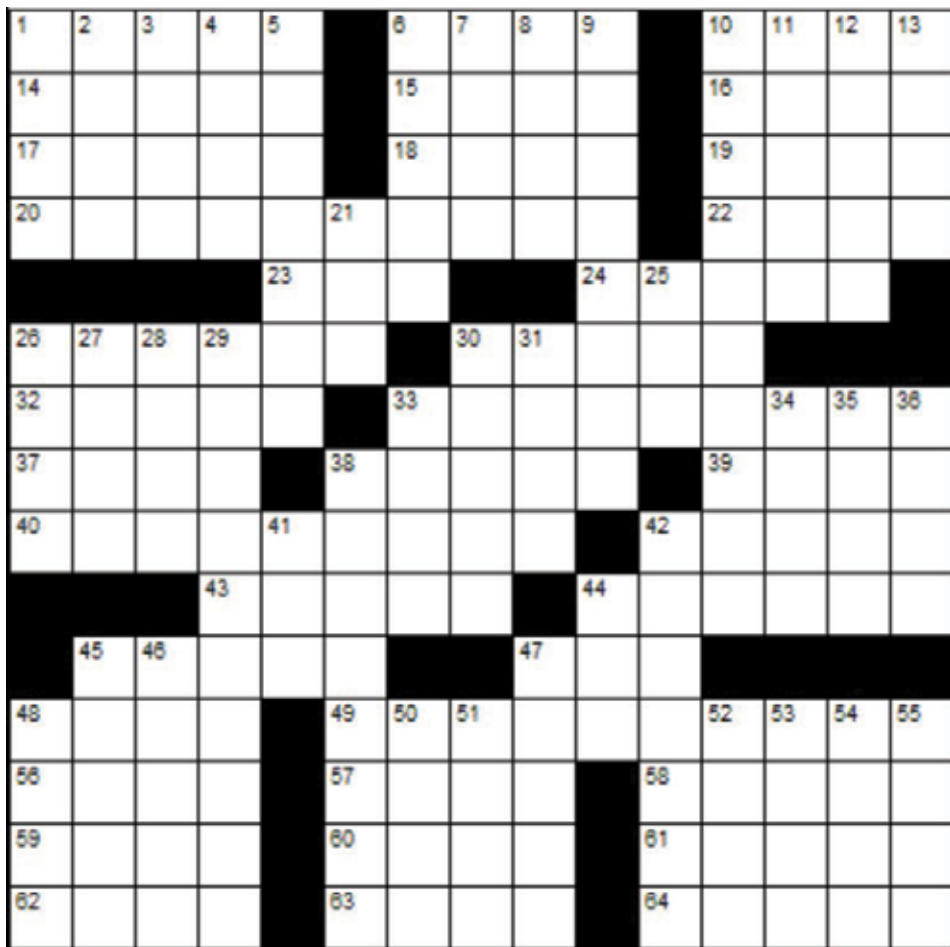
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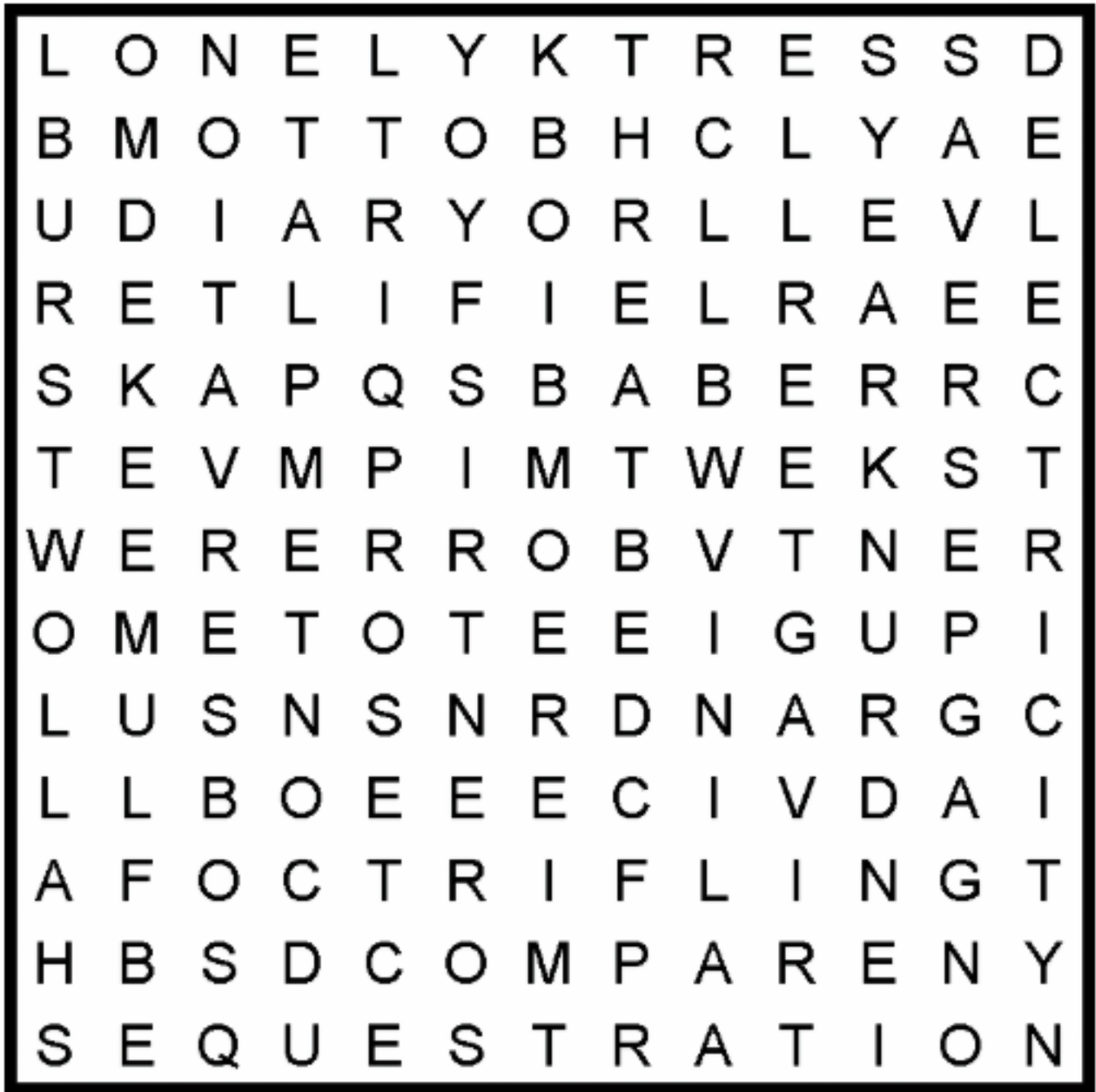
