These small devices are crucial for your safety, especially in manufactured homes, so it's important to test them regularly and replace the batteries at least once a year.

Unauthorized Guests and Visitors

To maintain the safety and integrity of our community, we must ensure that guests and visitors are documented, and all residents or occupants have passed the required background checks. Unauthorized residents or guests who are not properly registered can lead to serious consequences for those involved. If you have any questions, please reach out to the community office.

Compact Car Parking Spaces

Our designated compact car spaces are intended for smaller vehicles - small sedans, coupes, hatchbacks, and subcompacts only. The purpose is to maximize visibility for driving around corners. Larger vehicles obscure the view for drivers turning and often do not fit properly. Please reserve the compact spaces for appropriately sized vehicles only.

Geriatric Syndromes (Complex Issues)

Falls: A major risk due to balance issues, weakness, and medications.

Urine Incontinence: Loss of bladder control.

Frailty: General physical decline, increasing vulnerability.

Health Risks and Diseases Associated with Agent Orange

Research has identified numerous health conditions linked to Agent Orange exposure, particularly related to its dioxin content. The following diseases have been recognized by various health organizations, including the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs (VA):

Cancers

Chronic Lymphocytic Leukemia (CLL)
Hodgkin's Lymphoma
Non-Hodgkin's Lymphoma
Soft Tissue Sarcomas
Lung Cancer
Prostate Cancer
Multiple Myeloma

Neurological Disorders

Parkinson's Disease
Peripheral Neuropath

Reproductive and Developmental Issues

Birth Defects... Increased rates of congenital disabilities in children born to exposed veterans, including spina bifida and other neural tube defects.
Infertility... Some studies suggest a correlation between Agent Orange exposure and reproductive issues in both men and women.

Other Health Conditions

Diabetes Mellitus (Type 2)... A significant increase in the risk of developing diabetes has been documented.
Ischemic Heart Disease... This includes conditions caused by reduced blood flow to the heart.
Chronic Respiratory Disorders... Such as asthma and chronic bronchitis, potentially exacerbated by exposure to herbicides.

The consequences of Agent Orange exposure are profound and multifaceted, impacting the health of veterans and civilians alike. Continued research and acknowledgment of these health risks remain essential for providing adequate support and resources to those affected.
